

Alpha Gamma Rho Builds A New House

The colony of Alpha Gamma Rho at Platteville has taken great strides ahead since the first meetings in Ulrich Hall in the fall of 1968. With continued drive and determination, the colony has worked to improve housing facilities for the men. On August of 1969 the Alumni Association of Platteville Colony Alpha Gamma Rho acquired the present housing facilities at 350 W. Pine. However, with growth and expansion, the Alumni Association deemed it necessary to further expand facilities for the Active Colony.

As a result, during the spring and

summer of 1971, the development and planning began for the construction of a new house. Along with the decision to build a new home came a whole new array of obstacles to overcome. First of all, a tract of land was purchased at 845 W. Madison Street. Then blue prints were drawn up, permits were secured and a general contractor was awarded the bid to construct the house.

The new house is designed to have accommodations for thirty-two men, a housemother, and facilities for dining. Meals will be served to all members of the

fraternity and it is hoped that the large dining area may also serve as a party

At the present time, construction is progressing as planned, and if no major delays occur, occupancy should be approximately on January 1, 1972.

Excitement is reigning supreme for the active members at 350 W. Pine in anticipation of the move to the new facilities. Let's hope that this new house will symbolize an era of greater growth for all fraternities. We think it does for the AGR's at Platteville.


Social Report
