Brother Mike Martz #154 and his wife Lynn (a former Rho-Mate) have built a very successful grain and cattle business in Maple Park, Illinois (near DeKalb) in partnership with Lynn's family. Lynn is in charge of the cropping operation which is 6,500 acres. Mike runs the beef feedlot operation which finishes 7,000 head per year. Included in the custom feedlot operation are cattle that are feed out for other owners. A unique feature is their use of Ultra-Sound technology which enables them to send cattle to market at an ideal time. Because of this, buyers are willing to pay a premium for cattle from their feedlot. You can find out more about Mike and Lynn's farming operation at www. Larsonfarms.com.

Mike grew up on a 6,900-acre grain farm near Lanark, Illinois. After high school Mike enrolled at Highland Junior College in Freeport, Illinois. After graduating from Highland in 1976 Mike enrolled at Platteville and majored in Agricultural Education. Mike was a member of the Xi pledge class. Amongst Mike's memories in AGR include the "Skip Out" to Illinois State in Bloomington, Illinois. Another memory involved a horse at the college farm. Mike commented that he met many AGRs while showing cattle and he knew if he had the chance. he would become a member. Mike's fondest memory of AGR at UW-Platteville was meeting Lynn. Lynn grew up in Maple Park, Illinois and enrolled at UW-Platteville after graduating from Kaneland High School. At Platteville she majored in Agri-Business. Lynn recalls when she started at Platteville there were only five females in the College of Ag. When Mike started at UW-Platteville he shared an apartment with two other men that he knew from Highland Community College, Earl Heimerdinger #153 and John Meyers #152. All three that lived in that apartment pledged AGR and all three married Rho-Mates.





After Platteville Mike started teaching Vo-Ag at Pearl City, Illinois where had student taught. Mike recalls taking some of his students to tour UW-Platteville. One of those students was Brother Ken Gibson #231.

Mike and Lynn married in 1979 and went into partnership with Lynn's parents and Lynn's brother. Soon after joining the partnership, they managed a 1,200-acre beef operation near Rewey, Wisconsin. Nine years later they sold the Rewey location and moved to Maple Park, Illinois.

In addition to their busy farm life, they are active in their church. Lynn as the treasurer and Mike as Church Council Chair. Mike served as the President of Illinois Beef Association for 2 years and the Governor appointed him to the Illinois State Fair Board. They also are active in a Livestock Development group that helps producers navigate the permitting process.

Mike and Lynn's son Justin has also joined the operation. Justin and his wife, Jamie, have three children which are involved in FFA, 4-H and sports. Justin was the Noble Ruler of the Alpha Chapter at the University of Illinois. Tragedy struck Mike and Lynn on January 20, 2000 when they lost their son Doug to a heart condition. At that time, they were thankful for the support they got from several AGR brothers.

Mike and Lynn appreciate the relationships they have made through Alpha Gamma Rho. They attended the 50th Anniversary where they renewed many old friendships and were impressed by the size of the crowd. In closing the brothers of Beta Gamma continued on page 2

SOA faculty members Dr. Joe Sanford, Dr. Chris Baxter and Advisor David Heimerdinger were awarded a substantial grant from the CHS Foundation to advance the university's precision agriculture initiatives. The Dairy Innovation Hub continues to provide resources expanding our research and outreach capacity supporting the Wisconsin dairy industry. This fall, Advisor Dr. Ryan Pralle conducted several interviews and news stories highlighting the investment at Pioneer Farm in a GreenFeed machine that offers a unique opportunity to directly measure the microbial activity within the cow's digestive system. Reach out to Ryan if you want to learn more about the science behind measuring cow burps!

Our collegiate crops and soils teams continued the tradition of success with high placings at annual regional and national contests. Most recently, the crops team placed third overall in the 90th annual National American Royal Kansas City Collegiate Crops Contest and the 95th annual National Chicago Collegiate Crops Contest. Undergraduate

brother Jack Lichte was a member of both teams and placed individually in both contests. Undergraduate brother Brayden Peter was on the cover page of the November 2024 edition of "The Berkshire News" a publication of the American Berkshire Association. There was a great article highlighting the hands-on learning and Berkshire breed at UW Platteville's Pioneer Farm Swine Center.

A major project this year will be assisting the chapter with the transition from OmegaFi to ChapterSpot as our new member database platform for AGR. ChapterSpot is a product of the extremely successful business software, Salesforce, that provides integrated solutions which will help brothers become more efficient and connected. The fraternity has implemented an AGR ChapterSpot Transition Team to assist the local chapters through this process. This transition is underway and will be implemented throughout 2025. Beta Gamma Colony - Session II

This article is a follow up to the article that was in the December 2023 Crescent about the beginning of Beta Gamma AGR Colony in Platteville. The initial group of Founders were generous in sharing information that the editorial board thought it would be good to share more stories of our beginning.

Steve Mergen made a comment that I think speaks to the true grit and foundation of Beta Gamma, "Initially it seemed like

only a pipe dream, but as we added more fellows with similar interests the momentum became unstoppable". Wegmueller's attitude of "what do we have to lose" was soon adopted by those attending the meetings in Ulrich Hall on September 26, 1968.

Don Von Rueden has a story to tell about 350 W. Pine Street before it was inhabited. In November of 1969 Don, Alumni Secretary at the time, was carrying the first edition of the Crescent down to the Post Office. As he walked past the house, he noticed that a large cement truck had pulled into driveway of 350 W. Pine Street. He knew that there was supposed to be a cement truck the next day for when a crew was planning to help cement the entire basement. Don apologizes if he gets a little of this wrong or if he left out a name, however, Mike Myers, Steve Windett, Mike Krutza and Mike Miller were rounded up along with tools to rush to the house to take care of the basement project a day early. Unfortunately, the cement company put an additive in the cement to make it cure quicker which presented another issue! The project got done and was not perfect.... just ask the guys that lived down there. Frank Friar recalls that we filled as many five-gallon buckets as needed to empty the cement truck and placed them strategically around the back yard. Rumor has it that John Wegmueller had an encounter with one of those hard objects late one evening. Don and others had to throw away such items as shoes, clothes, etc. that were victims of being pressed into service on that day.

Stan Smith shared a story about the first pledge class, Alpha. He recalls that there were meetings in Ullrich Hall one evening and there was a rumor that the Alpha pledge class was going to kidnap an active or two and haul them out to the country. Stan and another brother (whom he can't remember) parked outside of Ullrich Hall and followed Mike Krutza and other pledges as they went out of town. Stan followed them with his headlights off and said that they almost beat the pledges back to town with the kidnaped actives. Stan does admit, however, that it probably was not very smart to drive in the dark without lights!

Mike Sands remembers that AGR was initially viewed on campus with some disdain, maybe a lot of disdain. We were considered as interlopers in the Greek system, we did not "belong", had not paid our "dues", we weren't the "cool" kids on campus, engineers, etc. We were



just a bunch of farm kids who wanted to organize as a fraternity. Mike says, "As we began our journey on campus, our activities began to garner respect". Jeff Key remembers "outmuscling" the LSPs (the jock fraternity) in an intramural basketball game. Coach Dale Schraeder, one of the UWP basketball coaches was a staff member at the game and was very complimentary of the AGR basketball team. At our first participation in the homecoming game, "Tug of War", the championship

came down to two teams, the LSPs and AGRs. The AGRs chanted "We drink Milk" and "We eat Beef" and defeated the LSPs in a very long, closely contested pull. Thus, we started to earn respect on campus but not necessarily with the LSPs!

Steve Mergen describes Beta Gamma finding the first House Mother for the new house. Steve was student teaching in Hillsboro and needed a place to stay. Helen Johnson had a room to rent that he gladly rented. One night, Helen and her daughter from Montana were discussing the possibility of Helen having to go to assisted living. She was getting on in years and had some health issues that required attention. Steve knew that Beta Gamma was looking for our first official housemother. He explained to her that she would never be alone as she would have college boys to watch over and conversely, they would watch over her. The next day, she made the trip to Platteville to meet with the leadership crew. Her return to Hillsboro was full of excitement, liking what she saw and would take the job if it was offered as it would give her another family to love and cherish. Steve said that Paul Onan and Francis Friar were very instrumental in welcoming Housemother Helen and insuring her acceptance by the brothers.

In conclusion, Don would like to share a couple of examples of being an AGR is forever. There are Alumni groups that gather, some monthly. One such group started by Brother Ron Goplin meets twice a month in Verona, Wisconsin, once for breakfast and another day each month for lunch and cards. This group has expanded to include some non-AGR alumni because they think it is cool. There has been as many as 20 and as few as 6 but the conversations and fun enjoyed are as if it were back in the house or on campus.

The second example involves Wayne Reiche, one of the Colony founders, and John Meyers. They were working on a project in 2015 involving a 345,000-volt transmission from Brookings, SD to New Ulm, MN. It was an 800-million-dollar project that took 3 years to complete. Wayne indicated that the two of them were a force to be reckoned with as they trouble shot the project. Along the way in discussions, they realized that they were not only AGRs but also Platteville Beta Gamma brothers.

Alumni Spotlight Stan Smith #59

Parades were both a thrill and an inspiration for Stan Smith, a farm boy growing up in Argyle in Lafayette Courtly. "I dreamt of having a collector car I could drive in parades," Stan says. "Even at a young age, I liked old things." His boyhood wish came true in 1970. when he purchased a shiny new metallic-blue Ford Mustang Mach I with help from his dad. Now



54 years old and with 76,000 miles on it, this collector car looks just as it did back then. After a hard spring rain washes away any remaining salt from the pavement, it's time to take the car out of storage and on to parade routes in Juneau, where Stan now lives, and the rest of Dodge County too. And once in a while, it rolls down the road to Lafayette County, where the story began. Stan grew up on a dairy farm in Argyle and met his future wife, Barbara, in high school. They married in 1967 and had a daughter, Maria, a few years later. Studying comprehensive agriculture education at what is now UW-Plattevillle. While attending UW-Platteville, Stan was among the group of young men that organized to form a Colony of the Alpha Gamma Rho fraternity. Stan graduated in 1969 and landed a job teaching vocational agriculture and advising FFA students at Barneveld High School. In April 1970 the Lafayette County Draft Board sent a notice to Stan. His draft letter was unexpected, though he was proud to serve his country. He was teaching agriculture. married and had a daughter, which should've kept him stateside at least temporarily.

Little did he realize, this "mistake" put him closer to his dream. It set about a need for a dependable car for Barbara, who worked 1 S miles away at St. Clare Hospital in Monroe. Stan's dad, Francis, was concerned his son's family car, a Chevelle Super Sport. wasn't reliable enough for her commute. The only problem was, Stan and Barbara didn't have the money for a new car. The search started at Phillipson's Garage. where Francis bought all his John Deere equipment and Ford vehicles, Francis was a thrifty dairy farmer and only purchased used.

But he was willing to cosign a loan if it meant a better car for his son's family. And there it was sitting in the showroom window—a 1970 Ford Mustang Mach 1 with a 351 c.i. Cleveland engine and sticker price of \$3,271 plus extras. Some of the features on the window sticker told of a special car Cruise-0-Matic, sport roof, power steering, vinyl hi-back seats,

hood scoop, competition suspension, deluxe steering wheel. deep-dish sports wheel covers and color-keyed carpet. Stan had his car, but his career and life went on hold. In July 1970, he headed to basic training at Fort Campbell, Kentucky. Then it was on to Fort Bliss, Texas and finally, South Korea. For the next 2 years, Barbara drove the Mustang to work.

In the years after Stan's service, he and Barbara restored the Mustang to honor Francis for making the purchase possible. It been in 1984 with new quarter panels, paint replicating the original metallic blue, a new exhaust system and more. The Mustang looked just as it did at Phillipson's Garage years earlier. Now it was ready for show! "One of my favorite parades was on return to Argyle years later," Stan recalls. And seeing my father sitting along a curb waving to me in the car he helped purchase. "When we decided to restore it, the job cost money. During the parade when Dad and Mom were watching, I saw him smiling like heck and realized I was living my dream. They were proud to have helped my family. And I'm a proud veteran. It was tough at the time, but we made it." Over the past 4 decades, Stan drove his Mustang in parades throughout Dodge County with Barbara by his side. After she passed away in 2012, his granddaughter Selena would sometimes take Barbara's seat. Stan says he'll never sell the car due to the memories it holds. Someday, he'll gift his prized possession So it stays in the family, "I wouldn't trade it for anything." he says. His boyhood dream of driving in parades revs on.

Wisconsin FFA Honors Impactful Leaders

The Wisconsin FFA Hall of Fame recognizes individuals who have remained committed to the organization throughout their entire lives and have immensely impacted it in a positive manner. The members of the Wisconsin FFA Hall of Fame are recognized by a plaque in their honor at the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection. The Hall of Fame Recognition plaque is made possible by the Wisconsin FFA Foundation. The following individuals were inducted into the Hall of Fame at the 95th Wisconsin FFA Convention:



Frank Friar #114 - Mr. Frank Friar has served agriculture as an educator, business leader, mentor, consultant and financial advisor. He learned farming growing up on a small family farm in Grant County which led to his very practical approach and understanding for farm management. Following college and military service, he taught high school and community college classes and proceeded to work for 30 years in agriculture lending with Farm Credit Services. He then joined the Farm Center at the Wisconsin Department of Agriculture Trade and Consumer Protection as an Economic Development Consultant for 15 years. In total he consulted Wisconsin farmers for 45 years. He has always been a strong supporter of agricultural education too. He served on the implementation committee creating the Wisconsin Agricultural Education and Workforce Development Council and the WDATP Secretary's Panel on Agriculture Education making recommendations for all levels of agricultural education. During State FFA Conventions, Mr. Friar has served as a judge

for numerous years in many different areas.



Dr. Mark Zidon #651 - Dr. Mark Zidon grew up in North Dakota where he was an FFA member while in high school. He attended North Dakota State University and then taught high school agriculture in both North and South Dakota. He then moved to lowa teaching at lowa State University and finally onto Platteville. It was at UW-Platteville where Dr. Zidon found his perfect fit as the position combined both his love for Ag Education and Ag Mechanics. For 34 years he taught and mentored at UW-Platteville for those becoming agricultural educators. He shared his passion for teaching students in every situation for real-world jobs. Having taught himself basic computer programming skills, Dr. Zidon pioneered a computer scoring program for CDEs. This breakthrough technology led to him sharing his leadership and skills with CDE events. For 38 years he served on the National FFA Agricultural Technology and Mechanical Systems CDE team and was the superintendent for 6 years. In Wisconsin, he served as the superintendent of the UW-Platteville FFA career development events for 33 years, and the same number of years

supervising the FFA events at World Dairy Expo. He has been a judge for the FFA Parliamentary Procedure contest at every level and was the University Representative on the Wisconsin FFA Foundation Board of Directors.

Both Frank Friar and Dr. Mark Zidon have strong ties to Beta Gamma. Frank Friar #114 was a Founder and played a key role in the purchase of the first house at 350 W Pine Street. Dr. Mark Zidon #651 was an Advisor to the undergraduate Chapter. Congratulation to Frank and Mark.
