Jim Lang

Jim Lang is located in the southern tip of Paraguay in a German colony called Colonia Obligado. This area is a fairly wealthy part of Paraguay where forty per cent of the farmers own tractors and a limited range of farm equipment from a one to three bottom plow to a combine for the wheat and soybeans. Jim is a crop extension agent for the Servicio de Extension Agricola y Ganadera (SEAG) of the Paraguayan Ministry of Agriculture and Livestock. His main function is a soil and crop specialist in relation to farm chemicals and fertilizers. Most farmers in the area know about chemicals and fertilizers but how to use them is a different story.

At the present time, Jim has four projects going which keep him busy. The first project is an experiment with fertilizers and chemicals. He has three plots in various areas that contain eight subplots. Each subplot has different fertilizer and chemical application and attempts to show the farmers which is best in yields and economic returns. Jim says so far these plots have had a magnificent impact on the farmers, as many are using these fertilizers.

His second project is to plant soybeans in these plots. Soil samples are taken and Jim's main concern is in raising the soils low PH and increase its organic matter.

Project number three is centered around the tree called Tung. A highly crude oil is refined from the nuts but the main problem is weed control during harvesting. He has treated this hectarea plot with a non selective herbicide called Paraquat. He is trying to make

the harvest easier and prove to the farmers that chemical weed control works.

Project four is working with a number of small farmers who are trying to farm cotton and corn on a soil that is pure sand. As an alternative to their repetitive lack of progress, he is introducing reforestation with a fast growing tree called Kiri. In seven years they can harvest these trees which at that time may have a midtree diameter of eighteen and one half inches. Its very profitable in returns because of the high grade quality of the wood.

Jim started his volunteer work in January, 1975 and plans to serve for twenty five months. He has enjoyed the experience very much and feels it has changed him in many ways.

Dan Matthias

Working in the foothills of the Andes in a town called Santa Domingo des los Coloradoes is Dan Matthias. Dan joined the Peace Corp in the fall of 1973 where he worked as a cattle extentionist in a little town called Puerto Linoin.

A brief look at agriculture in Ecuador we find that in the past the mountain valleys were primarily utilized for agricultural production. In the past twenty years it has opened up the tropical and subtropical areas for colonization projects to alleviate that overcrowding in the mountainous areas. The area around Santa Domingo de los Coloradoes was one of the areas opened. The rain clouds that come in off the Pacific Ocean have to rise to go up the Andes and as a result they lose a lot of water, therefore rainfall averages one hundred thirty three inches a year.

The Heifer Project and Peace Corps came to the area about nine years ago and started introducing the Brahaman cattle. An experiment farm was started and manned by Peace Corps volunteers. In these years many problems have been discovered and solutions tried. Some have done some good, others were forgotten. An extention program was started and more information was gathered and also some teaching of the local farmers was begun by the extensionists. Later in 1973, Catholic Relief donated some money for the erection of a training center, complete with living and eating facilities for participants. It was completed in 1974 and to date has held seventeen classes of from three to six days, about tropical cattle production for cattle farmers in the area.

About the time Dan was getting into the job of an extentionist he was asked to come out to the farm and work as coordinator of the school. This is his present job and because of this he was required to push his termination date to January 1, 1977. Dan is planning to be in the Wisconsin area some time in December.

In addition to Dan and Jim we also have John McMahon and Dave Wagner who are also Peace Corp volunteers. Both John and Dave are stationed in Quito Equador.

RON SUDA is the latest victim of cupid. Ron recently got engaged to Diane Schultz and have an April 3 wedding in Plain, Wisconsin planned.


