

Advisors Comments

The fall semester, 1987, can be evaluated as a series of pluses and minuses. Fortunately, most of the marks are in the plus column.

For the first time since the house was occupied in January, 1972, there is a significant shortfall of men living there. There are 23 men in the house this fall, two of whom are pledges. This also marks the first time a pledge has lived in the Beta Gamma house. Both these men are brothers of Beta Gamma Alums.

Why the shortfall? There are several reasons. Five undergraduates did not return to school this fall. A few actives who did return chose not to live in the house. This is a condition which must be addressed. However, even if all the actives returning to school this fall were committed to living in the house, the residency would still not reach 32. There simply aren't that many actives.

All this points to negative experiences elsewhere. For too many semesters, we rushed too few people and initiated too few of those who pledged. In some instances, we have rushed and pledged "high risk" people who could not be initiated, or who have dropped out of school. People have been rushed, pledged and initiated without a clear understanding of the obligation they have to live in the house. Some have argued that rather than a misunderstanding, it is a matter of "conditions" within the house which causes them to choose other accommodations. In either case, the goal to be achieved is an understanding that pledging implies both the obligation and the opportunity to live in the house for a minimum number of semesters before graduating.

As you know, it was the over numbers concern influenced the decision of the Alumni Board to postpone plans for expanding the chapter house. Instead, the Board made a commitment to a major refurbishing project. The actives returned to a house this fall that was in the best condition it has been in for a number of years. In addition, the rent was reduced so as not to be a deterent to pledging. An Alumni Recuiting Chairman and Committee was named to assist the VNR-Recuitment in conducting a summer rush. Over 50 freshmen (men) were identified and contacted before school started. Attendance at "Ag Fest" was outstanding. The rush functions drew good members. Finally, the largest pledge class in several semesters began it's training program the last week in September. If they all complete the program successfully. we will welcome 12 new members to Beta Gamma Chapter.

A successful spring rush and pledge program wil go a long way toward recovering lost ground. I feel confident that the rush and pledging programs this fall have achieved the quality growth as well as the desired numbers. All alums and actives are encouraged to begin now to identify the fall, 1988 pledge class from among the outstanding high school seniors in your community. The system worked well this year. Now that we know it can be effective, let's begin to prepare now to make it even better in 1988.

One final note to the alums who returned for homecoming. Your support of the College of Agriculture Homecoming reception at the Elk's Club, immeditaely following the game, was very much appreciated. AGR Alums were the dominant group there. If everyone who attended will return next year and bring along one more alum, the Agricultural Alumni Chapter would soon have to have a larger facility to host the reception. Wouldn't that be great!


