THE AGRICULTURE CHAPTER, **UW-PLATTEVILLE ALUMNI ASSOCIATION**

The following article has been submitted by Mr. Francis Friar, who is Board President of the UW-Platteville Agricultural Alumni Association. He is in his 2nd year of his three-year term. He was also on the board fronm 1979-1982. Mr. Friar has also served on the AGR Alumni Board as Alumni Treasurer for three or four years. He also is one of the founding fathers of the Beta Gamma Chapter. Mr. Friar is currently vice-president of Farm Credit Services of southwest Wisconsin which is based in Lancaster. He has been employed with the firm for twelve years. Francis Friar and his wife, Judy, reside in Platteville with their three children.

The purposes of the Agricultural Alumni Association are: To promote the welfare of the College of Agriculture at UW-Platteville; to promote the mutual beneficial relationship between the College of Agriculture and its alumni; and to cultivate friendships among its members.

All graduates in Agriculture from UW-Platteville are alumni and are eligible to membership in the association. Payment of dues is a requirement for active membership. The dues are \$10 annually or \$25 for a three-year membership.

The Ag. Alumni Association is a chapter of the University of Wisconsin-Platteville Alumni Association. The formal name of the Ag. Alumni Association is The Agriculture Chapter, University of Wisconsin - Platteville Alumni Association. The President of the Ag. Alumni is on the Board of Directors of the UW-Platteville Alumni Association. The Board of Directors consists of ten members, nine from the active membership and one member shall be exofficio from the College of Ag. faculty. This person currently is Dr. Robert Campbell. Some of the major activities of the Agricultural Alumni Association are:

A) The Association will host a hospitality reception on Saturday, October 7 in association with the World Dairy Expo. All High School Agriculture teachers are in-

vited to attend.

B) Agricultural Alumni Scholarships are awarded annually at the spring recognition banquet of the College of Agriculture. Five new freshmen and four continuing students will attend school this fall with financial support from these scholarships.

C) The Ag. Chapter is involved in Homecoming by sponsoring the luncheon and the post-game reception each year. More information on these events appears in the HOMECOMING EVENTS article in the Crescent.



DR. CAMPBELL RECEIVES **EDUCATOR AWARD**

Dr. Robert Campbell, professor of Agricultural Education at UW-Platteville and former advisor of the Beta Gamma chapter, has received the "Agricultural Educator" National Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association (NVATA) Region III Special Citation for 1989. The event occurred at the 72nd annual awards banquet of the Wisconsin Association of Vocational Agriculture Instructors (WAVAI) held at the UW-Madison campus along with the group's summer in-service conference on July 13th. Wisconsin is one of six states that make up Region III of the NVATA. Dr. Campbell will represent Wisconsin and Region III Teacher-Educators at the convention of the American Vocational Association to be held in Orlando, Florida in early December.

Sharing in the awards ceremony was John Croft of Growmark, Inc., a memberowned cooperative headquartered at Bloomington, Illinois. The WAVAI-NVATA also gives recognition to an organization that has given outstanding support to the agricultural education profession.

Dr. Campbell began his teaching career at Wasaukee High School in 1955. He also taught vocational agriculture at Lake Mills before joining the UW-Platteville College of Agriculture faculty in 1965. He served as chairman of the Department of Agricultural Industries from 1983-1988 and is currently the Program Director for Agricultural Education.

Dr. Campbell is a graduate of UW-Platteville, holds a master's degree from UW-Madison, and the Ed. D. degree in Agricultural Education from the University of Missouri. He is a member of the Wisconsin Vocational Association, Wisconsin Association of Vocational Agriculture Instructors, the American Vocational Association and the National Vocational Agriculture Teachers Association. Dr. Campbell is also a life-member of the state and national FFA Alumni Associations and holds both the national and state honorary FFA degrees. Dr. Campbell also serves on the Wisconsin FFA Alumni Council, the FFA Foundation Board and is a member of the executive committee of the newly formed Wisconsin Leadership Council for Agricultural Education. He's also a contributing author to "A History of Vocational Agriculture in Wisconsin" (F.J. Doering, 1976) and to a series of curriculum guides and re-

source materials for agricultural education.

Dr. Campbell and his wife Patricia reside in Platteville. Their daughter and three sons are all graduates of UW-Platteville.
