On Saturday April 2nd the Beta Gamma Chapter of Alpha Gamma Rho at UW-Platteville celebrated its 50th Anniversary in grand style. Alpha Gamma Rho at UW-Platteville dates back to the late 1960's when the Wisconsin State University-Platteville Colony was started. In April of 1972 the Colony status was removed and we became the Beta Gamma Chapter of Alpha Gamma Rho. 388 Brothers, guests and dignitaries from 14 different states attended the banquet held in Platteville. The celebration provided an opportunity to renew the bonds of Brotherhood that we have taken over the past 50 years.

The weekend kicked off with a social at Steve's Pizza on Friday night. It was helpful that we had name badges at the social because many brothers have grown out not up and there were some with gray hair and some with no hair. On Saturday morning the Annual Meeting of the Beta Gamma Alumni Association (see separate article) was held in Russell Hall on the UW-Platteville campus. Also on Saturday Brothers and their guests could see how much the UW-Platteville campus and the UW-Platteville Pioneer Farm have changed over the past 50 years, via tours led by the Undergrads and the Chapter Advisors.

The Undergrad Chapter hosted an Open House and a luncheon at the house. This gave many Brothers and opportunity to see the addition and improvements made to the house over the past 50 years.

The 50th Anniversary Banquet was held on the UW-Platteville Campus at Velzy Commons. Brother Ken Gibson served as Emcee he led us in a word of prayer and a moment of silence to honor those Brothers who have passed away over the past 50 years. Brother Gibson also introduced the Beta Gamma Alumni Corporation Board of Directors and the Undergrad Chapter officers and the Undergrad Chapter Advisors.

Dr. Chuck Steiner Assistant Dean of the College of Business, Industry, Life Sciences and Agriculture (BILSA) welcomed those in attendance on behalf of BILSA Dean Wayne Weber. Steiner also serves as a Chapter Advisor for the Undergrad Chapter.

Rex Martin, Chief Executive Officer for the National Alpha Gamma Rho addressed the crowd. Martin gave high praise for Beta Gamma on reaching the 50 year milestone. Martin also commented on how great it was to see a gathering of this size celebrating Brotherhood in AGR. Martin explained that this was the first celebration in over two years due to Covid and it was good to see the bonds of Brotherhood as strong as ever.

Over the past few years the Beta Gamma Alumni Corporation has started a scholarship fund to reward members of the Undergrad Chapter. Aaron Frey and Cole Krueger each received \$500.00 Recruitment Scholarships from the Beta Gamma Fund which is housed at the Educational Foundation of Alpha Gamma Rho.

The will of Brother Dennis Valstad #75 left a sizable donation to Alpha Gamma Rho at UW-Platteville. The Alumni Board decided to use some of Brother Valstad's contribution to establish a scholarship in his name. The recipient is nominated by the Undergrad Chapter to a brother who is hard working, have an interest in Agriculture and be of high moral character all this is what Brother Valstad stood for. 



Honoring Those Who Have Served - Brother Richard Jarvis By Dave Ward #85

With Memorial Day approaching a day set aside for honoring the men and women who have passed while serving their country and to thank those who have served their country. Brother Richard Jarvis (#27) is doing his part to honor those who have served our country. Richard (Dick) Jarvis a member of the Delta Pledge Class graduated in 1973 with a degree in Agri Business. Brother Jarvis has found a meaningful way to give back to his Wausau, Wisconsin community and its military veterans by his involvement in the "Never Forgotten" Honor Flight Hub in Wausau.

The mission of Honor Flight is to transport American's Veterans to Washington D.C. to visit the memorials dedicated to honoring those who have served and sacrificed for our country. Participation in an Honor Flight gives veterans of World War II, Korea and Vietnam to travel with fellow veterans to remember friends and comrades lost, and share their stories and experiences with each other. The Honor Flight Network is a national network of independent Hubs working together to honor our nation's veterans the trip to Washington D.C. a trip that many would not be able to afford.

Brother Jarvis first learned about the Honor Flight Program when he was a companion with his father Ray Jarvis on an Honor Flight originating from Appleton in April of 2009. Ray Jarvis was a veteran of World War II. After the Honor Flight with his father Brother Jarvis told of his experience to his Wausau Early Bird Rotary Club. Dick said he could tell by the reaction from his fellow Rotarians that the interest was there to start an Honor Flight Hub in the Wausau area. On Veterans Day 2009 the "Never Forgotten" Honor Flight Hub was started. Jarvis said the "Never Forgotten" Honor Flight Hub, which serves veterans in 13 northern Wisconsin counties, has flown groups of veterans and their companions 39 times Jarvis personally has participated in 38 of these flights. Brother Jarvis said he has witnessed many times that when these veterans of WW II, Korea and now Vietnam leave in the morning they are 85 year men and women, when they return they are 18 year old soldiers. "People who have never met form an instant bond of brothers in arms" Jarvis explained. Dick also mentioned that a few of the Green Bay Packers have joined in and visited with the Honor Flight participants.

Bother Jarvis explained that there is no government money involved in the Honor Flight program. "It's funded completely through donations many of which come from local fundraisers." When Dick and his father took that Honor Flight back in 2009 many of the participants were WW II vets. Over the years and several flights there are very few WW II and Korean War vets but the number of Vietnam War vets has grown.

Brother Jarvis encourages anyone who is a Vietnam War veteran or knows of one to look into taking this trip to see the memorials built in their honor. If you are interested go to the Honor Flights website: www.honorflight.org

We pledged in the Fall of 1983 and were the Beta Gamma Pledge class, almost 40 years ago. There were 11 of us. Jeff Agnew, Todd Gerlach, David Hill, Todd Klahn, Kevin Klubertanz, Brian Long, Ron Martin, Todd Stiede, Kent Weigel, Taylor Weisensel and myself. My pledge class elected me as Pledge Class President. This meant you were responsible for their faults and deficiencies as well as your own. It was my first semester at UW- Platteville after transferring from Sauk Valley Community College (Dixon IL). My Big Brother was Tom Bull. Vem Pierce was our Pledge Trainer and Steve Chamberlain was his assistant.

I don't believe my pledging experience was any different than those of that era. Butter run, Line ups, completing your interview book, a skip out to lowa State, and learning the necessary curriculum to pass the national test.

The most dramatic thing I experienced while pledging was our first line up. Lights off in the basement, spotlight turned on you and then questions asked of you about the chapter and national fraternity, you knew the person asking had no clue what the answer was but expected you to know. I went to my bedroom that night upset and ready to quit Alpha Gamma Rho. Denny McDougal came and talked me out of quitting.

Our class had two lineups. Due to the weekly schedule of the fraternity, they were held on Wednesdays. I think our finest moment as a pledge class was picking the right Wednesday and being away from campus. We were together as a pledge class, away from campus and no one could find us. We did not return till around 10 pm. Some actives were upset, others expressed pride that we could pull it off. The lineup resumed the following week, and we became a pledge class.

This story is supposed to be about a 40-year-old bottle of Jack Daniels Whiskey. I turned 19 in the Fall of 1983. The legal drinking age in Illinois was 21, but 18 in Wisconsin. In my head, I was not of legal age. I didn't like beer, usually quit after 2 cans. I did enjoy a champagne breakfast as a graduating senior, and was the only time I remember being imbibed at UW-P.

The night of Pledge Banquet, Vern Pierce, our Pledge Trainer did his part of the program. I don't remember going from pledges to actives. Vern

presented me with a bottle of Jack Daniels. If I was a normal "frat guy" I would have drunk it all that night and kept the bottle as a "badge of honor". I know it sat on my bedroom shelf a lot of years, it moved with me when I got married. I am sure my wife, Marianne asked, "what is this all about". Over time, I thought I would take the bottle back to Platteville and share it with my pledge brothers. Beta Gamma's 50th anniversary was that day and close to my classes 40th anniversary.



When I shared my plan with Kevin Klubertanz, he said "I agree." seems like a good time to crack open that bottle. Time Flies".

Four of us made it to the 50th celebration. I would have needed bring a backup bottle if more had made it. I haven't seen any of pledge brothers in 20 years. I served on the Alumni Board in the early 1990s and have not been back to a Founder's Day since. The 50th brought back so many memories and really showed me what being brothers is all about. Ken Gibson did a phenomenal job emceeing and the tragedy that he went through. I remember meeting him as an FFA Member while he was serving as a State FFA Officer.

Alpha Gamma Rho-Beta Gamma has provided us with great tors and a great network of friends for 50 years. I am glad I kept that bottle of whiskey.

On April 2, 2022 the Platteville Alumni Association of Alpha Gamma Rho held its Annual Meeting in Russell Hall. The meeting was held in conjunction with Founders Day and the 50th Anniversary of the Beta Gamma Chapter of Alpha Gamma Rho at UW-Platteville. There were 112 Alumni, Undergrads and Guests in attendance.

Alumni Board President Michael Long called the meeting to order. Board Secretary Justin Nehls read the minutes of last year's virtual Annual Meeting, Alumni Board Treasurer Jordan Alf reported that:

- Dues collections are up
- Income and expenses are on budget
- We should break even by years end which is June 30th
- The Alumni Association's net worth stands at \$475,792

Three Board positions were up for election. Michael Long and Jordan Alf were reelected for three year terms and Brother Kevin Klubertanz was elected to a three year term to replace Justin Nehls who did not run for reelection.
