Remember when?

Tom Kellom - Out West

The following is an open letter from Tom Kellom in which I asked him to write a little bit about the kind of work he does and a little about living in Idaho.

Dear Brothers:

I am an animal husbandman for the Agricultural Research Service of the USDA. The location is the U.S. Sheep Experiment Station which does investigations in the production of range sheep. My specialty is the compiling of research records. The data collection involves considerable work in the field. Data is collected throughout the life of the sheep from the weight at weaning until the sheep is saved for breeding stock or sold for slaughter. An inventory of 4,000 mature ewes, 1000 ewe lambs and 600-800 rams are kept. We are working with three range breeds, Rambouillet, Targhee, and Columbia plus various crossbreeds. Both Targhees and Columbias were developed at the station years ago.

We are truly a station, 15,000 acres of semi-arid high desert isolated from a population center, Idaho Falls, by 55 miles. Dubois is a small town of about 500 and Clark County's total population is less than 1000. The sheep graze the station in spring and fall and spend the summers on higher mountain range controlled by the Forest Service. Part of the winter is spent on winter range and part in a feedlot with pelleted alfalfa.

If you can, picture a band of several thousand ewes and lambs which are under

the guide of a competent sheepherder and which follow the whims and lush feed. When frost kills the lushness, they return to lower elevations and durable desert grasses. Only winter's snow drives them to alfalfa.

The mental, social, and moral development experienced in Alpha Gamma Rho is only the start for life after college graduation. I've found opportunities for leadership even in a small town like Dubois. I serve as board member and music director of the Dubois Community Baptist Church, as secretary for the Dubois Lions Club, and as treasurer for Dubois American Legion Post 28. I feel gratified for some of the experience I had as an A.G.R. and for my success as a community participant. I hope this can have a maturing effect for younger A.G.R.'s.

Idaho boasts some good western scenery, mountains and trout streams. Two of my hobbies, cross-country skiing and fly fishing make the best of these natural resources. These things are a bonus which one may not consider when he moves West.

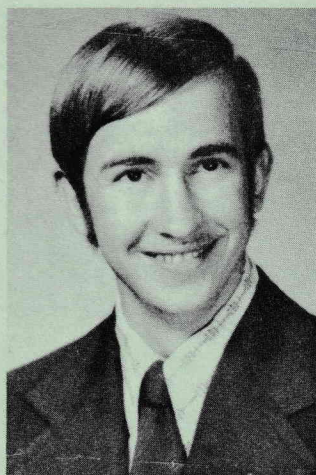

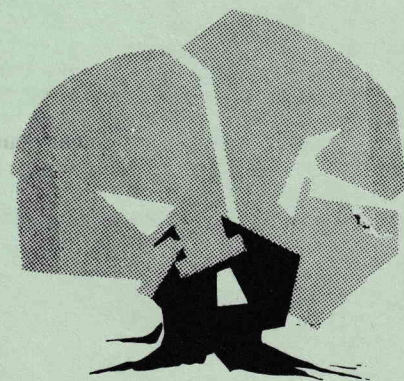
House Manager Comments

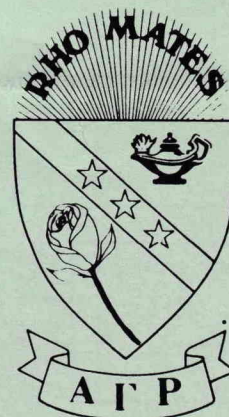
Rho Mates

JIM ZANDER is a junior majoring in Animal Science. He comes from a dairy farm near Barneveld, Wis.



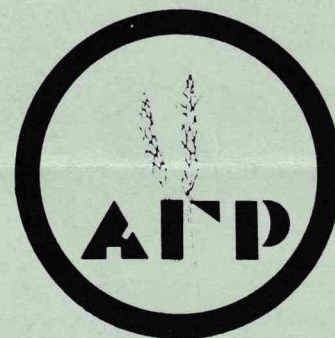
Omicron pledge class - spring, 1976.

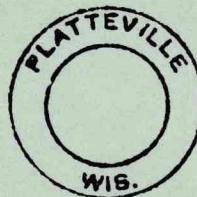
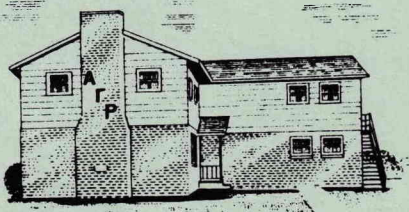
