## Schaefer Serves as State FFA President



**Brother Dave Schaefer** 





### From The Dean's Desk

Dear Alumnus:

It's simply amazing how fast time seems to fly by. There has been considerable activity in the College of Agriculture since I wrote to you in the last Newsletter. Although the agricultural economy continues to take its toll in student enrollment in Colleges of Agriculture across the nation, we as of last fall, seem to be holding our own. Our enrollment as a whole is down due to losing a large graduating class last year in particular. I often wonder if the general public, and many of those in agriculture, realize the gravity of the situation, as our agriculture and indeed a good part of our affluence is dependent on technoglogical advances and competent leadership. A shortage of well-prepared graduates in agriculture will I am sure, take its toll in years to come.

The College has taken major initiatives in addressing the enrollment challenge. The faculty will have made 21 career presentations and addressed seven FFA annual banquets at high schools during the course of the year. With the College's new display unit, we will have participated in at least seven large agricultural trade shows and expositions. All high school vo-ag departments have received personal letters introducing ourselves and offering assistance re career presentations, speeches, etc. I personally accompanied approximately 40 guidance counselors for 21/2 days of a "seminar-onwheels" program where we visited many businesses, farms, etc. During this period we had the opportunity of describing what agriculture and we as a College have to offer young people. A very unique initiative this year has been the formation of student recruitment teams. Presently, these teams are in the process of visiting 21 two-year colleges in Iowa, Minnesota, Illinois and Wisconsin. Additionally, we're in the process of preparing a new videotape on the College. Our 2600 alumni responded well to a request for potential student name referrals, for which we thank you. I would also like to indicate to you the tremendous effort that the University High School Relations Office is making. At this writing, admissions to the University are running 4% higher than last year. I hope that Ag is part of that 4%.

I mentioned earlier that enrollment problems are confronting practically all Ag Colleges in the nation. Some have suffered up to a 50% decline in enrollment over the past five years. To address this problem, a national media

campaign is in the making. I represent the non-land grant colleges (65) on the planning committee. As alumni, we need your support in our recruitment efforts. Just think if every alumnus recruited one student, we'd have a freshman class of 2600 - not bad! As I see it, enrollment will be our major challenge until the end of the decade.

If you live in Wisconsin these days, you've undoubtedly heard of the state's fiscal dilemma. This will impact on us and perhaps very seriously. The University is now going through the painful exercise as to how to cope with it. However, when the going gets though, the tough get going. I am optimistic that the University and College will come out stronger as a result of it, but it certainly will have its testing moments.

I remain impressed with the commitment of faculty and program quality in the College in spite of enrollment and fiscal problems. There is sample testimony to this end. For example, the recognition of Bob Schauf as Wisconsin's Outstanding Young Farmer, Mark Riechers as First Runner-Up and Alan Jewell as Second Runner-Up; all UW-Platteville graduates. Dr. Higgs' soils and crops judging teams remain in the top two in the nation. The student Agronomy and Soil Conservation Club was cited as the nation's top student chapter by the American Agronomy and Soil Conservation Society. Dr. Cropp added another to his impressive collection of awards by an award from the Wisconsin Farm Bureau. Dr. Loberger was awarded the Honorary Farmer Degree by the National FFA; and the list goes on.

During the past year, the College has initiated a faculty professional development program. Supported through accumulated discretionary funds (contributions, etc.), the program allows faculty to attend and participate in seminars, symposia, short-courses, etc., to a limited degree. The majority of the faculty have availed themselves to this program, which I have indeed been pleased to see.

One of our new alumni, Randy Binversie was the student commencement speaker at the December graduation exercise, and had an excellent presentation. Members of Alpha Gamma Rho (AGR) ushered the ceremony as well, hence our students continue to play an active role across campus. Four members of the College Faculty (Drs. Higgs, Jahn, Loberger and

Cropp) and myself will be traveling to Seville, Spain on March 7 to present a seminar along with our Spanish counterparts. This, and many other extracollegiate activities continue to involve practically all of our faculty.

The 1986 Governor's Conference on Agriculture will be hosted by UW-Platteville on March 24. We hope that many of you will be able to attend. The theme of the Conference will be "where do we go from here" with particultar reference to the 1985 Farm Bill and other State and Federal Policies. Senator Tom Harkin, Iowa, along with Governor Earl will "kick-off" the Conference.

Several enhancements to the College cirriculum were implemented this past year. The creation of an Agricultural Engineering Technology major and two new courses in Veterinary Science are being taught by our new staff veterinarian, Dr. Louis Landau, have been put in place. For the Spring semester (1986) we've "lucked out" by being able to retain three highly qualified individuals to lecture in the College: Dean Charles DeNure - Land Economics; Dr. Harry Henderson - World Food and Agriculture; and Mr. Stuart Urban -Agricultural Law. In addition, Mr. David Passe (soon to be Dr. Passe) joined our staff and instructs in the area of agricultural economics and marketing. He replaces Dr. Gary Bruning who left the University due to ill-health. Mr. Mark Weihing is on educational leave from UW-Extension and is assisting in the instructional program as well as working towards his M.S. Degree.

In the new "Newsletter", I hope to be able to tell you a little more about our "Partners-In-Research" program. The thrust of this program will be to foster cooperative research between our faculty and staff with farm organizations, small businesses, etc. In other words, "grass-roots" oriented applied research. Again, more to come.

In summary, there are a lot of good this happening in the College. We've got some exciting future initiatives on the agenda in the area of biotechnology and international ag education and rural development. However, we have a few formidable challenges ahead to address. In any event, we need and appreciate your continued interest in the College and your support.
