

"MAY I INTRODUCE..."

It's Parent's Day at the house. A fine crowd has gathered and it is a beautiful day despite the cool April breeze. The food line is moving along pretty well and we're getting close to . . "Oh cripes, there's the advisor and his wife standing there greeting people as they come through the line. I know he's going to expect me to introduce Mom and Dad, but I feel awkward and uncomfortable doing it. Maybe if I don't say anything, he will introduce himself and that will take care of it."

Three years later . . . Mom and Dad and my younger brother are in town. They want to see where I work. We'll go to my office this morning after breakfast. There usually isn't anyone around on Saturday morning. "Cripes, there's my bosses' car. He will expect me to introduce my folks and my brother. I wish I had paid more attention to those kinds of things when I was living at the house."

Sound far-fetched? I don't think so. The common social graces do not appear automatically with commencement. Most AGR members expect to be employed in an agricultural profession following graduation. There are certain, well established principles of social/professional etiquette that will enhance your image in an interview and will carry over to contribute to successful performance on the job. A 30-minute skit each semester on "etiquette night" will not sufficiently prepare you. There will be no handy "how to" guide inserted in the folder holding your diploma. If your social skills are no better at graduation than they were when you pledged, you have failed a very important aspect of college and fraternity life.

There are simple rules associated with making introductions which, when mastered, will make you feel good and will add to the comfort of those around you. Always extend your hand and introduce yourself to anyone who does not know you. This applies especially when you are on your own turf, i.e., at the chapter house, or at your place of employment. At a business function involving people outside your company, include the name of your employer when introducing yourself. (Hello, I'm Gary Jones, with ABC Equipment.' A firm sincere handshake is appreciatd. (Somewhere between the bone-crusher and the dead-fish.)

A young person should always be introduced to an older one (Mr. & Mrs. Advisor, I would like you to meet my date, Gloria Vanderbilt.') A person of lesser rank is introduced to a person or greater rank (Mr. Walton, may I present my partner, John Jones. John, this is Mr. Herbert Walton, President and CEO of Wal-Mart Discount Stores.') A male is presented to a female of similar age and social status "Mom Johnson, I would like you to meet Professor Smith. Dr. Smith, this is Mrs. Helen Johnson, our housemother.")

The first impression created in a job interview is critical. There might not be a second chance. Dress professionally, but conservatively ("Gosh, I might feel more comfortable in this suit if I had been more cooperative with the chapter policy on dressup days.") Secure and review a copy of the company's annual report. Arrange to visit with a current employee of the company, preferably an alum. Greet the interviewer with a sincere smile and firm handshake. Remain standing until the interviewer invites you to sit. Sit "At attention" and concentrate your attention on the interviewer. Do not use "ma'am" when speaking to a woman ("Yes, Mrs. Wilson" is preferred to "Yes ma'am") Anticipate questions that will be asked and be prepared to verbalize your answers. Have some questions of your own in mind. At the conclusion of the interview, rise, express your appreciation, and shake hands again. Follow up with a letter to the interviewer within two days. Use the letter to present yourself again, in summary fashion, as a person worthy of consideration.

This article barely scratches the surface of the topic dealing with social/professional etiquette. One paragraph on interviewing is a woefully inadequate treatment of the subject. There are many, many more facets that have not even been mentioned here. What are your responsibilities as a dinner host, either in your home or at a restaurant? Is it "O.K." to bring someone with you to a social or business party to which you have been invited? Who should pick up the check at a business luncheon? When and where is it appropriate to smoke? What is the proper way to accept wine at your table? What foods may properly be eaten with the fingers? How do you know which table utensil is to be used for a particular purpose (Why do I have three spoons?") When is it appropriate to call your superior at home? Is it O.K. to use a customer's phone to call another client?

It should not be necessary to learn the answers to these questions and many, many more, while on-the-job. A quality pledge-education program will give extensive treatment to the issue of social/professional etiquette. Perhaps it would be helpful if a CHAPTER HANDBOOK ON SOCIAL/PROFESSIONAL ETIQUETTE was developed and used throughout the pledging program. The content of the HANDBOOK must also be applied continuously to chapter meetings, guest diners, alumni activities, and all other forms of social/professional events, if it is to be anyting more than a pledge-training requirement.

"To make better men . . ." We continue to say that. Let's do something about it.
