PROPOSED RESTRUCTURING PLAN FOR THE COLLEGE OF AGRICULTURE

At the present time, the College of Agriculture. is in the finalization stage of restructuring. The big question asked is, "WHY." It all started in 1990 when the State Board of Regents decided that there was too much replication in the four Ag. Colleges in the state, which include UW-Platteville, UW-River Falls, UW-Madison, and UW-Stevens Point. The board stated that Wisconsin did not have enough money to keep the programs going at a high quality. At that time, the board told each school that they must look at their programs to see where their resources could be reallocated. Each College performed extensive study of their programs. Last March, the board sent a group of experts from a variety of other states to spend a day at each school to give suggestions. The biggest concern of all schools, was that resources and faculty were being over extended to meet the needs of the college and students. If we were to continue, we would not be able to uphold the same quality of education as we currently have.

Here is what UW-Platteville College of Agriculture has proposed:

The primary objective is to maintain a high quality College of Agriculture at UW-P. Planning Assumptions include a temporarily decrease in the enrollment while restructuring is being implemented. There will be a reduction of the number of majors to a maximum of five. At least two FTE faculty positions will be identified for reallocation. Finally, the complete plan will require four to five years to implement. The reduction of majors will begin with the students who enroll in the fall of 1994. Students enrolled in majors to be terminated will be able to complete those majors.

The UW-P College of Ag. committee met several times and after extensive discussion proposed the following:

Agri. Business
Ag. Education
Animal Science
Soil and Crop Science
Reclamation

Majors to be terminated:

Ag. Economics

Ag. Engineering Technology Technical Agriculture

Minors to continue:

Agribusiness Animal Science Minors to be terminated:

Ag. Economics

Ag. Engineering Technology

Crops and Soils Horticulture Technical Agriculture

Other Programs to be continued:

Biotechnology Minor- jointly listed with College of Arts and Sciences.

Pre-Vet- jointly listed with College of Arts and Sciences Masters in Agriculture Industries. Other Issues:

The Pioneer Prairie Farm will be used more extensively. The goal is to incorporate more farm use into the classes. The farm will become a center for demonstration purposes that relate to teaching and research activities. Applied research opportunities for faculty and undergraduate research opportunities for students will be a part of the farm mission.

The core courses in our college agricultural curriculum will be reviewed in light of the college's greater focus. One topic to be discussed by the faculty is the possible requirement of an interdisciplinary senior-level capstone course. This is a class that takes in all that a student has learned in a variety of subjects, and applies these skills to real-life situations.

The combined efforts will develop an excellent and effective college that provides quality students with a high quality education in agriculture. Any questions of concerns, contact Dean Lindahl, College of Agriculture Dean.




