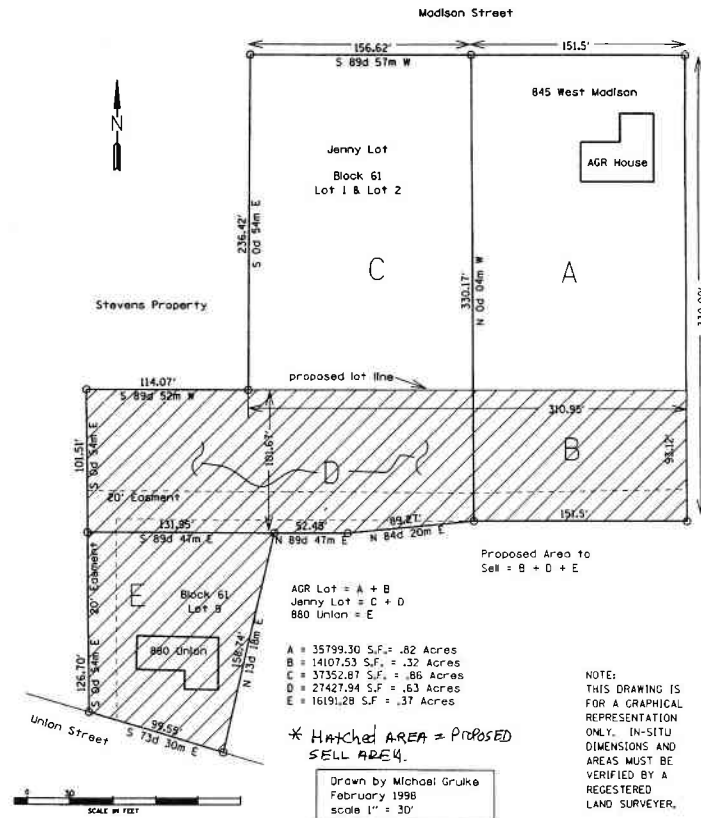
INTRODUCING THREE NEW MEMBERS TO BETA GAMMA

The attached drawing is the land use proposal brought forth by the Alumni Board Financial Committee.



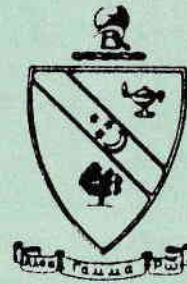

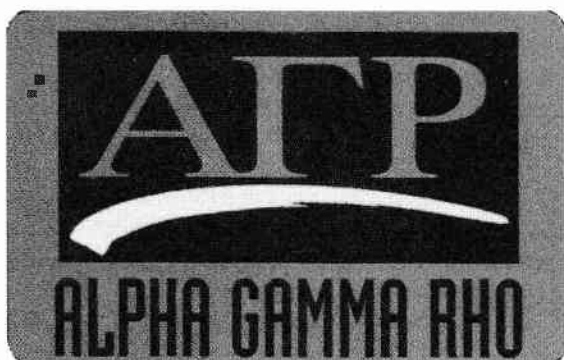
Alumni Corner...

My name is Dave Bohnhoff. I was initiated in Spring 1976 (Omicron pledge class). I was born and raised on a dairy farm in Plymouth, WI. I graduated from Plymouth High School in 1974 and enrolled in the (now defunct) agricultural engineering program at Platteville the following fall. I put my BS degree to work in January of 1979 as a design engineer for Gehl Company in West Bend, WI. After two years of skid steer loader design, I left Gehl and returned to Plymouth where I farmed with my dad and brother.

On July 2, 1982, I married Rhonda Johanning. That fall I enrolled in the agricultural engineering graduate program at UW-Madison and received my Ph.D. in early 1988. I was hired as a professor at UW-Madison upon graduation and have taught and conducted research in the agricultural structures area since. During 1995-1996 (while on a leave of absence from the University) I served as Division Manager of Research and Product Development for Lester Building Systems in Lester Prairie, MN.

I am currently building my own house in Madison with the help of my wife and my three sons: Benjamin (15), Christian (13), and Aaron (11). We hope to have the house completed before Aaron graduates from high school.

I have volunteered to help on the AGR alumni facilities committee because of my interest in construction and my concern about the future of the fraternity in Platteville. In addition to helping plan and assist in major house remodeling, I would like to help plan and construct a new garage. As I envision it, this garage would be a well-insulated post-frame structure about 36 feet wide and 50 feet long with a minimum interior clear height of about 14 feet. One end would have a mezzanine for storage (about 16 x 36 feet), with the area under the mezzanine used for activities that require only 8 feet of headroom (car repair, carpentry work, weight training, etc.) The other end would be kept clear for winter-time basketball, float building, larger parties, and other fraternity activities. I would estimate the cost of the completed structure to be about \$25,000 assuming that we provide the labor. Current zoning allows for construction of such a structure. I believe that this garage would have a major positive impact on recruiting. I see it as the center of activities as brothers gather, for example, on a Sunday in winter to work on cars, watch TV, play cards, shoot hoops, lift weights, etc.



My name is Terry Cushman. I was an honorary member inducted during the time when Robert Cropp was Dean of the College of Agriculture. I was his assistant at the time. I have a B.S. (1976) in Agri-Business with a minor in Ag-Mechanization and a M.S. (1995) in Agricultural Industries (Comprehensive).

I was involved in the agricultural equipment industry for about 15 years before accepting a position with the College of Agriculture as the Assistant to the Dean in 1986. In 1991, I became the Coordinator of Orientation and Registration in the Office of Admissions and Enrollment Management and served the University in that capacity until May of 1995. I have been continually involved with the University on a part-time basis since that time holding responsibilities for the recruitment of out of state students.

My wife (Cheryl) and I have three children; Cole (15), Carly (12), and Carter (10) who will attend school in the Platteville School District. My wife has been employed at Southwest Health Center for 18 years in various roles, most recently as Outpatient Clinic and same-day surgery nurse. We also own 520 acres north of Platteville and enjoy being close to agriculture through actual involvement in soil stewardship and livestock production. I also consult businesses and individuals in planning their business structure, estate planning and investment decisions.

I was asked to serve on the Advisory Council to assist in recruitment. I can say from experience that the AGR organization is the most active and responsible group when contacting prospective students. It is an honor for me to be able to assist Alpha Gamma Rho Beta Gamma Chapter in recruitment of new students into their organization.

My name is Herb Yanke. I was initiated Spring 1984. I graduated from UW-Platteville in 5/87 with a BS in Tech Agriculture. Since that time I've been farming with my family in Prairie du Sac, Wisconsin. Since my father's retirement, it has been my cousin and myself. We have a dairy operation of 70+ cows and also raise steers. Our crops include alfalfa, oats, corn, soybeans and vegetables for a local cannery. Pioneer approached us in 1992 to see if we would consider taking on the sales of Pioneer for this area. I accepted the challenge and have been a sales rep since.
