## **Advisor Report**

SPRING 2007



Spring is finally here!!! The robins are back and the active chapter is also looking forward to nice weather. There has been quite a bit of optimism and excitement regarding the future of the chapter house. The undergraduate chapter welcomes the vision for the planned up-

dates, renovation and possible addition to the chapter house. As you may be aware, the Alumni Board under the leadership of Scott Laufenburg has been busy addressing housing issues, concerns and directions and is working with a consultant to develop strategies for a fund raising program to address the future housing of the chapter. Further information regarding future housing and this years Founder's Day activities will be addressed in greater detail later in this crescent.

Over the past two years, I have had the distinct pleasure to have David Heimerdinger as co-advisor for Beta Gamma. David as you may be aware is an alumnus of Beta Gamma and currently teaches in the Industrial Studies department in the College of BILSA at UW-Platteville. David brings a unique perspective to the advising role and provides valuable leadership to the chapter. I appreciate the sacrifices he makes to attend all of the Beta Gamma meetings, activities and functions.

Overall, it has been a great year for the undergraduate chapter. They have achieved the highest overall GPA for all active Greek chapters on campus. This is a scholastic goal they had set for themselves and one they hope to continue to keep. Scholastics are a very important part of the Beta Gamma chapter. They have been involved in numerous community service activities and functions and continue to be well respected in the Platteville community. Recruitment went well in the fall with twelve new, high quality members joining Beta Gamma. This spring was almost as successful with nine outstanding young men being initiated into our ranks. In fact, six of those new members are exchange students from the Netherlands. Our AGR influence will be evident as those young men return to their home country later this summer. These students from Dronten Agricultural College have certainly added a new dimension to our Southwestern Wisconsin Beta Gamma chapter. We all realize now that the world is a much smaller place. Our

hope is that the Dutch students will take the seeds of fraternal brotherhood back with them and sow them. Who knows, may be some day there will be an AGR chapter at Dronten, the Netherlands.

In late February, David Heimerdinger and I had the distinct pleasure of attending the annual AGR leadership conference in Indianapolis with fourteen of the chapter's finest. This year's theme was "Leaders, One Step Ahead". The alumni can be very proud of our chapter because we certainly had strong leaders at the conference. These young men returned from the conference with great ideas and are excited about implementing some of them in the chapter. Unfortunately, no one from our alumni association made the trip to Indianapolis. It is sad that few alumni take advantage of the great programs put on by the National AGR office at these conferences. It is a very eye opening experience and it is good to know that our chapter was not experiencing most of the problems other chapters in the nation were observing. Every active and alumni member should attend at least one leadership conference sometime during their college or professional career.

In the School of Agriculture, the current Tristate Initiative which recruits students from Illinois and Iowa has been successful. Our current Ag enrollment is over 500 students. We anticipate that our total enrollment should approach and even exceed 600 through this program within the next three to five years. In fact, our growth rate has been so good that we are adding a tenure track position in the Agribusiness area. This is the first entirely new position in over ten years. These are exciting times because a high proportion of our new

initiates are from either Iowa or Illinois. This initiative should increase our potential pool of new initiates for Beta Gamma.

The new Pioneer Dairy Center should have cattle residing within its walls by the time you read this *Crescent*. There has been a few set backs in the past six months which prevented cattle from populating the center but those have all been resolved. The Dairy Center will hold 200 cows with half the herd being milked with robotic milkers and the other half milked in a traditional double five herringbone parlor. The dairy staff has looked forward to the move-in day for months. The dairy center personnel and I have also been working with the Iowa Ayrshire Club. They are in the process of donating Ayrshire embryos to Pioneer Farm. This will make a welcome additional breed to the dairy center once those embryos are implanted and calves are on the ground.

Finally you are welcome to stop by and visit the undergraduate members at the chapter house or the School of Agriculture any time. Many new and exciting projects are being initiated at the university especially the additions and renovations of the Ullsvik Center (the old student center) and at Pioneer farm. Being public facilities the buildings are normally always open but to be sure just call ahead for a tour. Stop by and see the robotic milkers at work. I will be looking forward to visiting with you in the near future either at Homecoming in the fall or at a future Founder's Day in the spring.



#### **Joost Jonk**


I am taking part of the exchange project between the Agricultural University in The Netherlands and the University of Wisconsin, Platteville.
