Establishment of AGR Colony In the fall of 1968, 34 men from the College of Agriculture formed a fraternal organization known on campus as Alpha Gamma Rho. The constitution was approved and on February 12, 1969, the group became the newest colony of Alpha Gamma Rho.

Alumni Corporation Formed In April, 1969, brothers Marotz, Salesman and Wegmueller formed an Alumni Corporation Board. The Board is working to obtain housing for the brothers of the colony. (Crescent No. 2, Fall, 1969)

**Alumni Purchase House** 

When the brothers of Platteville Colony of AGR returned to campus in September, 1969, they learned the Alumni Corporation had purchased a house at 350 W. Pine Street. (Crescent No. 2)

AGR's Build New House

During the spring and summer of 1971, the Alumni Board began planning for the construction of a new house. A tract of land was purchased at 845 W. Madison St. Construction is progressing as planned and occupancy should be on Jan. 1, 1972. (Crescent No. 6, 1971)

**Beta Gamma Chapter Installed** 

A dream became reality on April 22 when 88 members of the Platteville Colony were initiated and Beta Gamma became the 47th chapter of Alpha Gamma Rho.

On Thurs., Oct. 12, Beta Gamma chapter initiated six women as the first members of its little sister organization, the Rho Mates.


# Pioneer Prairie Farm Undergoes Modernization

The university farm has been undergoing new construction since October 1985, when work began on a new classroom/demonstration facility. The educational center replaced an office/classroom building that had been converted from a chicken coop. The new 90 x 75 foot building includes a classroom, a showring/arena, the farm director's office, and restrooms. The facility cost slightly under \$250,000.

Phase two, a freestall barn, began in August 1986 after the education center was completed. The barn replaced a hay shed previously on the site. This caused the hay to be stored in the machine shed which meant that some of the machinery has been left outside for the winter. The barn, which is nearly completed, will have stalls for 80 cows. The barn includes automatic scrapers, a manure pit, and a natural ventilation system. The project cost around \$250,000 also.

"The number-one advantage is that we will have a better environment for the cows," stated Rob MacSwain, dairy herdsman. The cows will be divided into four groups for specialized attention. The groups will be high producing, low producing, high somatic cell count, and dry cows. These groups will receive different feed rations and more individual attention to improve production efficiency.

The third and final phase of the modernization involves constructing a new herring-bone milking parlor, heifer barn, manure storage facility, and silo. The milking parlor is to be added onto the end of the freestall barn and will include 20 tie stalls, research and maternity pens, and a computer facility. The cost of this phase is expected to be \$600,000. Funds for the project have not yet been granted by the state, but the construction hopefully will be completed by the end of 1989.



Workers install comfort mats inside the nearly complete freestall barn.


## Pat Campbell To Serve As Rhomate Advisor




